Source: ZatsNotFunny An early version of Google TV never really caught on, as its main function is limited to searching for actors, sports teams, or channel names and pulling content from web and TV lists for you to watch. If you have a USB webcam, you can also turn the TV into a large video chat monitor, but there is not enough content on the platform to make Google TV a viable set-top-box replacement, especially since some TV network sites block streaming via Google TV (this doesn't seem to change in 2.0). The Logitech Revue is an early set-top box for running Google TV, and reviewers are disappointed. It's very expensive (\$299) for a device without storage or DVR capabilities, and requires a full-size keyboard to control it. Not surprisingly, Revue doesn't do well with consumers, as Logitech sees more Revues back than sold. A whopping \$200 price drop followed, bringing the Revue the equivalent price of an Apple TV for \$99 - which, coupled with an upcoming Google TV 2.0 software update, makes the product much more attractive. There is no word on when Google TV 2.0 will be released, as a reboot was promised this summer. Scott Webster at AndroidGuys expects the official opening of Google TV updated on November 8 at Streaming Media West 2011, a conference on the online video ecosystem, where Adobe, Hulu and CBS will be among the participants. Meanwhile, it is also unclear whether the new hardware will accompany Google TV 2.0.
